Based on our NY state school report card 36% of the total population of students were considered chronically absent. We have been focusing on attendance and made progress based on school monthly comparisons raising them 2 percentage points overall, but we need to continue our focus to lower the chronically absent numbers.

1. Sharing the Plan:
